Theme	<p>Introduction: About the poetess: Mildred Bowers is an American poetess who won the 1928 Yale Younger Poets Prize. In the poem, she describes a squirrel observed in her garden.</p> <p>You may have seen a squirrel sitting on the ground eating a nut. What did it look like? Here is a poet’s description of just such a squirrel.</p> <p>Poem. The Squirrel: He wore a question mark for tail, An overcoat of gray, He sat up straight to eat a nut. He liked to tease and play,</p>

	<p>And if we ran around his tree, He went the other way. Mildred Bowers Armstrong</p> <p>Meanings question mark for tail; The tail that looks like a question mark. overcoat of gray: the squirrel appears wearing a gray coat. tease: to make fun</p> <p>Summary The poet describes how the squirrel, covered in gray fur, sits in an upright position on a tree branch eating a nut. His tail looks like a question mark because of its bent shape. The happy and lively squirrel likes to play with the poet. The poet tells us about the nature of the squirrel that it is innocently naughty and likes to tease anyone who comes near him.</p> <p>You can also refer to the online NCERT English textbook- Honeycomb.</p>
